INTERVIEWEE NICK SAYATOVIC

SUBJECT : I ASKED MR. SAYATOVIC MANY QUESTIONS ABOUT BUTTE. HE TOLD ME ABOUT MINING IN BUTTE, & HOW HE SUPPORTED HIMSELF BY BEING A BUSINESS MAN. HE TOLD ME ABOUT HOW MANY ETHNIC GROUPS WERE IN BUTTE & HOW THE CITY WAS DIVIDED BY THESE GROUPS.

I TRIED TO KEEP HIM ON THE QUESTION I ASKED, BUT HE HAD SO MUCH INFORMATION TO GIVE ME; WE GOT OF THE TRACK MANY TIMES.

HE WROTE DOWN SOME NOTES OF WHAT HE REMEMBERED OF BUTTE AND ITS SURROUNDINGS DURING THE MINING PERIOD; THINKING THEY WOULD BE VERY USEFUL.

MR. SAYATOVIC BORN: 4-3-13 in ANACONDA MONT.

Thought about mining -

DANGEROUS, ONLY DID IT FOR 6 WEEKS.  
WAS HIT IN THE HEAD BY FALLING ROCKS  
HIS FIRST DAY ON THE JOB.

NOTES

NICK (MR. SAYATOVIC) WROTE OUT SOME NOTES  
THAT HE THOUGHT WOULD BE INTERESTING.

About 1923 we had an Ice Cream man by the name of Tally, he would come by horse & wagon, he had a bell on his Horse & would sell us ice cream cones for 5¢.

We had 2 men come selling fruit & produce out of wagons, Mr Murray was one & his daughter Katie still is living in Butte.

Calabrazo, was the other one, I don't know what kind of a name that is.

We had the Hansen packing Co. out by the Municipal Golf Course, they sold beef, pork etc. Hansen would send no beef out until it hung in the cooler for 7 days - In 1923 the other packing house wanted to ship it out in 2 days, they didn't want to absorb any shrinkage. Hansen made the Silver Bow Tard and Vitamin dog food, he shipped the dog food all over, some people ate it.

At the Columbia Gardens, we had a beautiful dance hall, the largest in the North west, 12 to 14 piece bands would play, big names like Harry James & Giel Harris.

We had another dance hall at Lake Avenue, this is where the Country Club golf course is now located, it was built out in the water on pilings.

Then we had the winter Garden ball room  
on Montana Street, it was up stairs across from  
the Elks Lodge & local bands like Eddie Thomas  
I believe was his name & John Kern, the King  
of Harmonies, he called his band.

Frank Barrie, had <sup>an</sup> ice pond out at Elk  
park & would deliver ice to Coolers around  
town in cold br. chunks for milk in Coolers.

We had Boarding houses on East Broadway  
& E. Granite street, it was family style;  
you could eat all you wanted, there would  
be, hundreds each day there, they would  
also make up buckets for the miners.

We had dog races out on the flat.

We had a street car in <sup>the</sup> McQueen collection  
we called it the Dinky, it would run from  
Featherwood Street to Cherry Street & meet  
the car's going uptown & to the Columbia  
Gardens, some of the rails uptown were  
left on the streets & just paved over.  
Very ago there were Cobble stones on  
Dakota & Main streets.

There were 300+ Finlanders in Butte at the time.
